2:42	Chaos? Always something spilt.
3:48	Sounds like it was fun...it was. We all get along very well.
4:27	Talk about you and Don getting sick. Contacted polio as young children – were treated at home by mom. They were both out of school for a year.
5:59	Don left with curvature spine and has back problems. Limps sometimes.
6:36	I remember you telling me happy things about polio. We were too young to realize how serious it was. We were taken care of, given treats.
7:44	Interesting that I married son of George Bubash, are of the original Salk scientists. Yes, he left Dr. Salk's team to go to Karen. Have correspondence between two men.
8:55	What did you think was going to happen in your life? Princess dream? No plans. No interest in going to college. Got good paying job.
10:19	Met C's dad at 20 years old. Your life seemed like a fairytale...marrying a college man.
11:50	Wanted something more than her parents – not nine kids.
12:59	Story of her leaving Pete Seeger concert because of folk singer's anti-war (Vietnam) rhetoric...seemed unpatriotic.
15:00	Composure your family with ours. Had three children close in age.
16:00	Can you tell us what happened later...when Lori got sick. C born premature.
16:50	Lori got sick during 1973 Reye's syndrome outbreak in Pgh.
17:21	She was not feeling well on Friday. On Saturday, A & husband left town... called parents telling them that Lori was constantly throwing up.
18:30	Doctor she calls up eventually decides to have L brought to hospital. L was screaming as she was brought to hospital. "We did not know why."
19:22	Talk about being at hospital and learning about Reye's syndrome.
20:57	We allowed the respirators to be taken off on Wednesday.
21:23	One of the reasons I wanted to do this today is because when I was younger you used to say I should write a book about this. You were 15. Regrets C was at hospital.
22:08	Felt she was lucky to have been there.
22:20	What should Glen and I do or not do? Talk to your kids and don't preach. When they talk to you as a person reciprocate.
23:56	Something people should do when sibling dies? Yes, but I don't know what. On how Glen and C reacted differently to sister's death.
26:06	Parents have been separated for 15 years. L's death a reason? Maybe. No energy to fix

	problems.
27:10	You did not get to finish the dream... Everything that came after was different.
28:25	Less effort put into fixing problems. On trying to act like everything was the same.
29:09	On disastrous trip to Disney World Easter after L's death.
30:32	I don't know what you should do. Every meaningful holiday time was sad.
30:58	C and brother have brought a lot of joy in her life. Sees L's death more as a loss for C and brother.
32:20	Calls C's youngest Lori sometimes.
32:47	Interesting that you tell me not to preach to kids.
33:17	She does not really have answers to everything when something bad like that happens, it humbles you.
34:58	Everybody likes to come to your house. She doesn't always express her opinions about everything.
35:52	Thank you for giving me that lesson. You never know what is right.
36:31	Parents not responsible for death. Right thing not to not always have the answers. You recognize that you can't control everything.
